
TSO HOLIDAY PARTY



How to find the name of your US Senator or House Member

One of the most important activities we can do is to lobby for change. Our collective voice, through grassroots efforts, makes an important contribution during the legislative process.

When you want to send an email or write a letter, you can very easily find the name of your United States Senator or Congress person.

For the House of Representatives, go to the following website: https://www.house.gov/

Once you're on that website, you'll see a box where you enter your zip code; then the name of your representative will appear. There will also be a link to your representative's website.

For your Senators, go to the following website: https://www.senate.gov/senators/index.htm

That will bring you to a page that lists all of the Senators. Enter your state in the appropriate box, and your two Senators will show up. Click on either name, and you will be brought to the Senator's website.

Your State Representatives

It's very easy to get the information you may need to call, write, or even visit the offices of your state assembly member or state senator.

Put in your home street address and zip code, click on the search button, and the name of your assembly representative will show up.

Living Kidney Donation through the National Kidney Registry (NKR)

The number of people on the UNOS waiting list for kidneys year after year represents more than 80% of all the people listed for all organs. So finding ways to perform transplants for those waiting is a challenge because there aren't enough kidney donors.

In 1954, a living donation for kidneys started the modern era of transplantation. The first successful kidney transplant was from a living donor, Ronald Herrick, at the age of 24, to his twin brother, Richard, in December, 1954, at Peter Bent Brigham Hospital. Richard lived for 8 more years after receiving a transplant, and Ronald lived until he was almost 80 years old.

So the promise of living kidney donation has been available for a long time. In fact, in 2018 there were almost 6,500 living kidney donors in the United States, 40% of all kidney donations.

In recent years, there have been significant efforts to encourage living donation, coming from several organizations. One of the organizations that has lead these efforts is the National Kidney Registry, started by Garet Hil. Garet donated a kidney in 2015 to provide a 'voucher' for his daughter who received a kidney transplant 12 years ago. Both Garet and his wife, Jan, were incompatible and could not donate to their daughter 12 years ago when she was on dialysis; now his organization helps recipients find well-match compatible living donors.

NKR is an organization where people in need of a kidney transplant can enroll in their paired exchange program through a participating transplant center and NKR will work on finding a well-matched compatible donor. NKR offers a full set of protections for living kidney donors to make sure the focus is on the donation and not on the concerns that accompany a person's desire to donate a kidney. Believe it or not, there are significant disincentives that make it difficult for someone to donate a kidney:

- Most employers don't compensate donors for lost wages;
- Travel expenses and lodging, to and from the transplant center, are generally not paid for by insurance or the transplant center;
- ♦ Although very rare, some insurance companies may cancel coverage or raise health insurance premiums after a donor donates a kidney;
- There may be post-surgical complications that are not covered by the patient's insurance or the transplant center;
- Sometimes post-surgical complications require the donor to take unpaid leave from work; requiring the donor to take unpaid leave from work;
- Finally, there is the concern donors have that someone in his or her family may need a kidney in the future, and the donor won't be able to provide a kidney for his or her loved one.

NKR has addressed these issues through its comprehensive Donor Shield program and provides the Donor Shield protections for every donor who participates in an NKR swap. Donor Shield includes the following protections:

- 1. Lost Wage Reimbursement up to 4 weeks
- 2. Travel/Lodging Reimbursement up to \$2,000
- 3. Donation Life Insurance with \$500,000 principle amount
- 4. Donation Disability Insurance up to \$1,500/ week for up to 52 weeks
- 5. Legal Support for unlawful termination and health insurance issues
- 6. Coverage for Uncovered Complications related to donation surgery

With this kind of comprehensive coverage, NKR seeks to eliminate disincentives that prevent many people from becoming living kidney donors. For more information on NKR, visit its website at www.kidneyregistry.org.

Enrollment Day

In fact, TSO played a very important part in this special event dedicated to Joel and recognizing Enrollment Day.

The Hospital set up it's lobby with photos and information regarding organ donation. A sign- up table was available and staffed by hospital volunteers and TSO's Carolyn Robinson and William Flynn, two avid volunteers. A large poster was on display in the lobby featuring TSO's Janet Ocasio with her story and a recent poem which was written regarding the power of organ donation to save lives.

A ceremony was held in honor of this event and Joel's retirement. Speakers included, Helen Irving, CEO of LiveOnNY, Assemblyman Buchwald, Mayor Picnich and Janet Ocasio. Joel was presented with a plaque for his longstanding commitment to the cause of organ donation awareness and thanking him for his support over many, many years both at Northern Westchester Hospital and at Mt. Sinai Medical Center. TSO thanks Joel Seligman for his support over many years and allowing us to participate in numerous events, including past Enrollment Day events. We wish him the best on his retirement and look forward to hearing from him as he enters this well earned phase of his life. We will miss him.

Part D Update

The Partnership for Part D Access has not rested, even since the announcement from Medicare that they would not change the status of the 6 protected classes (6PC), allowing patients unrestricted coverage to the prescription drug regimens they follow.

So what does that mean about keeping busy, if Medicare has taken that action? It turns out that the Partnership has detected some objection to the report that was circulated in Congress that supported continuing the 6PC. This was a privately-funded report from an organization called Avalere; the Congressional pushback is that it is baised and one-sided (not even close to being true, but facts are disputable in Washington these days).

So the Partnership is reaching out to members of Congress to push for a government-sponsored study from the Government Accounting Office (GAO). A report supporting the 6PC from a government agency will quiet many of the Congressional critics who have loud voices.

So that's the latest on the Partnership and 6 PC. Please let us know if you have any questions.

The featured event at the hospital was honoring Joel Seligman, CEO at NWH, for his 19 years of service as he steps down from his position.

Helen Irving, CEO of LiveOnNY, made some remarks about her long-time association with Mr. Seligman. She then presented a plaque from LiveOnNY and TSO to Mr. Seligman, recognizing his years of service and his commitment to organ, eye, and tissue donation.

The mayor of Mt. Kisco, Gina Picinich, offered her remarks, followed by Dave Buchwald, New York State Assemblyman from Mt. Kisco. Finally, Janet Ocasio spoke about her transplant journey and her long-term association with NWH. I know that I owe it to my donor; you could say that I made that promise over and over while confined to a hospital bed, staring at 10 different IV bags with all sorts of annoying beeping sounds with no turn off switch in sight and not enough dilaudid to help the pain but enough to put my mind in the dust. Some of you can relate. We all have our incredible stories of bravery and misfortune and yet we all stayed alive long enough to obtain an organ from someone who was selfless enough to sign that donor card, that DMV form, or who had a loved one who made the difficult choice. They made the right choice.

From LiveOnNY for our newsletter...

Transplant Support Organization Joins LiveOnNY for Fifth Annual Organ Donor **Enrollment Day**

On October 10, TSO partnered with LiveOnNY for the fifth annual Organ Donor Enrollment Day and helped enroll approximately 2,500 New Yorkers as lifesaving organ donors.

Several TSO members participated and helped educate the community. Liver recipient Janet Ocasio spoke at Northern Westchester Hospital during an event honoring their retiring CEO, Joel Seligman, for helping to raise awareness about donation. She was joined by several members of TSO who looked on as she read a moving poem about how her transplant transformed her life.

Additionally, heart recipients Ricky Gongora and David Verge held an enrollment drive at the Yonkers Public Library. The pair had many meaningful conversations about the power of organ, eye and tissue donation. Their hard work led to the City of Yonkers winning the award for Most Enrollments by a Municipality.

In total, there were 150 locations and activations in the greater New York area. A dozen elected officials participated this year and Gov. Andrew Cuomo issued a statement about the power of organ donation. There were more than 100 social media mentions and 30 press stories about the day, including one by NY1.

LiveOnNY was proud to once again partner with TSO on this important day. TSO has shown a deep commitment to raising awareness about the power of organ donation and LiveOnNY is honored to call it a partner.

How's New York Doing?

New York State is on track to exceed 2018 numbers for transplants, from both deceased and living donors for all solid organs, based on data from UNOS as of August 31, 2019.

And all of the New York metropolitan area transplant centers are on track to equal or exceed last year's results as well.

Thanks for this go to the tireless efforts of LiveOnNY and all of the donor hospitals in our region for their efforts on behalf of showing the good that comes from organ, eye, and tissue donation.


